 permitted.
- Make sure that you have all equipment needed for school. A list is part of this booklet.
- Keep in touch with your friends from Primary School. Share your feelings about the move.

- Read during the summer. The English and Arabic departments issue a suggested summer reading list, as does the Secondary Library.

Leaving Primary School

The First Day

How do I know which class I will be in? What do we need to bring to school on the first day?



The big day has finally arrived and you are now a 6th Grader. The first day at a new school can be exciting, daunting, worrying, fun. Most people experience a number of these and other emotions.

You must know that all staff will be there to welcome you and to help make things easy for you.

Arriving at School

When you arrive at the Secondary School go to the Multipurpose Room where you will meet the rest of your grade. You will be told which tutor group you are in and will meet your tutor teacher, as well as the Grade 6 Grade Leaders, School Counsellor, and the Head of G6-8. From there, you will go to your tutor class to receive information about the school and your school year.

The first part of the day will be spent in your tutor group with your tutor teacher. They will give you lots of information and answer any questions you have. You will also go on a brief tour to refresh your memory of the Secondary School layout.

You will also receive your timetable and your locker number.




School Supplies List

Your backpack may <u>not</u> be a rolling one (one with wheels) <u>unless you have an official</u> medical certificate from a recognised doctor.

The following items are NOT to be brought to school:

- Tippex / White-out
- Toys, balls etc.

Additional items may be requested by teachers at the beginning of the school year, but this should provide you with a good start!

The School Day

School starts every morning at 7:45a.m. with line up for anthem and ends at 3:15p.m.

Tutor Group (7:50 – 8:00)

Every day starts with a tutor group session. During tutor group your tutor will take the register and read out the **DAILY ANNOUNCEMENTS**.

If you arrive late you must take a late slip from reception before entering the first period.

Your tutor group is also the student group you are taught with for the majority of your classes, so you get to know your peers very well.

Break and Lunch Times

First break is from 10:15 - 10:50 and second break is from 13:10 - 13:40. As Tuesday is a short day, there will be one break. Snacks and food can be bought from the cafeteria or you can bring your own from home. Food may not be delivered.

Play Areas

During break times, Grade 6 students will be <u>allowed to go</u> to the cafeteria, the library and the Secondary School play area.

Grade 6 students <u>may not go</u> to the Community Square, the Moon Garden, gym/track, or the Primary School during break times.

Corridors must be kept clear during break times. This is for safety reasons. You are allowed to go to your locker when the warning bell rings (10 minutes before you are due to be in class)

Assessment / Tests

Most subjects set homework and formative assessments to measure how you are coping with the work. <u>Throughout a unit of study</u> and <u>at the end of the school year</u> you will have summative assessments in most subjects to see what you have learnt.

Assessments may come in many forms, including writing, multiple choice, vocabulary, oral and group and/or individual

projects.

Students can have one Summative assessment a day, though sometimes two assessments might take place on the same day. Be sure to keep up with the Assessment Calendar on Moodle so that you are prepared.

IMPORTANT: If a student misses an assessment, a note must be brought in from the doctor within five days of the absence in order for the absence to be considered excused. The student has five days to make up the assessment from when they return to school. All make-up days are held Tuesday and Thursday after school.

Homework

Homework is a necessary part of school life. All subjects give homework, but there is a homework timetable to ensure that homework is spread out fairly between subjects and that student's aren't overloaded. It is given for many reasons, but if you look at it in a positive way it is there to help you improve your learning.

The homework timetable can be found on Moodle, so that you and your parents can work to organize your time.

In grade 6 students should be doing between 60 - 90 minutes of homework and reading a night, or 5 - 7.5 hours per week if you consider the weekend.

Pastoral Issues

Who can help us if we have problems? Are there any bullies? Unacceptable Language How can we avoid problems?



Problems, Problems, Problems

Being a 6th Grader can be pretty tough. There are times when you might feel upset or angry or bewildered. There are several people you can ask for help.

Teachers

Your teacher is the first person you should speak to if you are having difficulty with a particular subject. You should not interrupt the learning process in the class for personal questions; instead ask to see the teacher during break.

Heads of Departments

If you want to receive another opinion on assessments and grading, the Head of Department is the person to see.

Tutor Teachers

Your tutor is a good choice if you are having minor problems and need a little advice.

Grade Leader

The Grade Leader deals with more complex issues including your behaviour in school and how you are progressing with your work. The Grade Leader may suggest that it will be a good idea for you to speak with the school counsellor.

Secondary School Counsellors

The school counsellors are there to listen and to help you make decisions to make your school life more manageable. They can help you with friendship problems, work worries, home concerns. You can see the counsellors during break and lunch, though sometimes you may be invited to visit during lesson time.

Nurse

If you are feeling unwell during the school day you must ask your teacher to give you a nurse slip so you can go to the nurse. This slip must be signed by the nurse and returned to your class teacher. Sometimes the nurse will decide that you should go home and the office will be informed that you have permission to leave school.

Students that are taking a medication must hand in the medication to the nurse at the start of each day and must visit the nurse as instructed to ensure that it is taken as prescribed. Parents should liaise with the nurse and Head of G6-8 in these cases.

Parents

Your parents can offer you advice and support. It is a good idea to let them know if you are having any difficulties in school. If you feel that you cannot ask an adult at school for help then your parents can do so on your behalf.



Remember

When problems arise, the sooner you speak with someone the better. People are in school to listen, help and support you when you need it.

Bullying

A student is bullied or victimized when he or she is the repeated target of deliberate negative actions by one or more students.

Direct bullying is a relatively open attack on a victim that is physical) and/or verbal in nature. Indirect bullying is more subtle. It can involve social isolation, intentional exclusion, rumor-spreading, making faces or obscene gestures behind someone's back, and manipulating friendships and other relationships.



We do not allow bullying at the Secondary School and immediately respond to students who report it.

Unacceptable Language

Name calling, use of bad language, talking about another person's family is not allowed. Students will be responsible for the words they use; families will be informed of the words and students will receive consequences. Therefore, students should not speak in anger.

How to Avoid Problems

There are many ways in which you can avoid problems at school. Some tips are:

- **Self-management**—regulating one's emotions to handle stress, control impulses, and persevere in overcoming obstacles; setting personal and academic goals and then monitoring one's progress toward achieving them; and expressing emotions constructively.
- **Social awareness**—taking the perspective of and empathizing with others; recognizing and appreciating individual and group similarities and differences; identifying and following IAA standards of conduct; and recognizing and using family, school, and community resources.
- **Relationship skills**—establishing and maintaining healthy and rewarding relationships based on cooperation; resisting inappropriate social pressure; preventing, managing, and resolving interpersonal conflict; and seeking help when needed.
- **Responsible decision-making**—making decisions based on appropriate conduct, respect for others, and likely consequences of various actions; applying decision-making skills to academic and social situations; and contributing to the well-being of one's school and community.

(Adapted from Social and Emotional Learning and Bullying Prevention)

Remember, if you need or want help; ask one your teachers, tutors, grade leader, counsellor at school. We are all here to help.

IAA Community Life

What are After School Activities? Are there non uniform days? Are there Bake Sales? What is Service as Action?



Outside of the classroom there are many of activities you can participate in.

After School Activities

Both sporting and non-sporting clubs are offered to students across the age range. Here are some examples:

Athletics, Art, Music, Drama, Robotics, Coding and Homework help in areas such as Maths, Arabic and other classes.

Listen to the Daily Announcements every morning so that you hear information about clubs and activities available. Also, the Daily Announcements are placed on Moodle if you need to remind yourself what was announced.

Non-uniform days

Usually, the last Thursday of each month is a non-uniform day. Students may dress in their own clothes, remembering to keep within the appropriate bounds. The proceeds of the non-uniform days go to support identified charities.

Are there Bake Sales?

IAA Secondary School does have bake sales. The proceeds of the bakes sales go to support identified charities.

Service as Action

Every student at IAA is required to complete at least one Service as Action activity. This is both an IAA and an MYP requirement.

Monitoring Student Behaviour

What happens when we are late / absent?

The Ladder of Consequences and the Behaviour Code explicitly state the expectations and the consequences in Secondary School, but to simplify matters as a school we believe that every student should:

- be responsible for monitoring their own behaviour, to understand what is right and wrong
- show respect for their environment
- uphold basic good manners treating others with respect and courtesy

- wear the school uniform in the correct way
- attend classes regularly and be punctual
- be fair and honest in completing school work
- follow school and classroom rules
- take good care of books and other school property

Sometimes some students forget these basic standards of conduct. When this is the case students can receive a consequence in a variety of ways designed to provide the time and opportunity to think about what has happened and plan for it not to happen again.

As well as speaking directly to the students, we communicate this through email, phone calls home and/or letters stating a consequence.

Monitoring Student Behaviour

Students are eligible to receive House Points throughout the day. House points are rewards for showing evidence of the IB's Learner Profile character traits of being: knowledgeable, inquirer, thinker, caring, reflective, principled, risk-taker, balanced, open-minded, communicator. You can earn House Point *Awards* when you reach 25, 50, 100, or 150 House Points!



Students can also be placed on *Teachers Plus*, which will track the number of infractions. For example, if a student disturbs a class, that teacher will note this on *Teachers Plus*. At three instances of the same infraction, a student will receive an after school detention.

The infractions do not have to be from the same class or teacher – simply three times is enough to warrant a detention. Should a student progress beyond a detention, we may require a monitoring of behaviour using a Behaviour Goal Sheet.

What should I do if I am absent from school?

If you have been absent from school, you may make up an assessment providing the absence is excused by a doctor's note or by representing the school on an event. In addition, you will need to catch up on the work you have missed so that you do not fall behind in your studies. To do this you must check each subject via Moodle and talk to your teacher.

It is <u>your</u> responsibility to meet with the teacher to catch up on missed work. <u>Any assessments missed must be made up within five days and during one of the after school make-up times</u> – which are on Tuesdays and Thursdays.



General Questions and Tips

Phones

Students are allowed to bring phones with them to school, as long as they are turned off and remain in the student's bag or are handed-in to the teacher at the beginning of each class. If a phone is seen or heard by a teacher, that student will have their phone taken away from them and turned into the Head of Grades 6-8 for 24 hours. Using your mobile phone to make a call or text during school hours is **STRICTLY FORBIDDEN**; phone calls will be allowed when it is urgent through the receptionist during break.

Birthdays

Students are not allowed to celebrate birthdays or other occasions during the school day. Food deliveries are not allowed.

Lockers

You can use your locker effectively in many ways. It can be used to hold books, paper and work, and make sure they are safe. You have to make sure you keep it organized and clean: keep your work in the right places, make sure you do not fill it up, but take some work at home and revise you work. However, you cannot go to the locker at any moment you choose. Make sure that during break times you have all your books and paper ready for the next two (2) subjects and do not go to your locker between the 5 min. you walk to your next class, otherwise, you could be late.

What to do if you get sick in school?

When you get sick in school, you have to go see the nurse during break. If you feel really bad during class, get a note from the teacher and go see the nurse. She will check on you and make sure you feel okay and may give you some medicine. If you have a high temperature she will send you home.

What if my best friend is not in the same class?

If your best friend is not with you in the same class, you can still see her/him during break times and lunch. You can still keep in touch with her/him by seeing her outside of classes in the extra-curricular opportunities IAA offers or in your free time.

What is the proper school Uniform?

Secondary School

- 1. Beige school-issue trousers **and** Polo shirts/formal shirts with collar **and** brown sweater (shorts are not allowed).
- 2. Shirts must be buttoned all the way until beneath top button.
- 3. Undershirts must be white in colour.
- 4. Undershirts must be tucked in the trousers.
- 5. It is not permitted to wear P.E. items on days when you do not have P.E.

If you are not wearing the correct uniform, you will be held in during break. You will be told to remove any non-school uniform jackets and coats.

P.E. uniform

1. P.E. uniform is to be worn on the days when you have P.E.

Footwear

- 1. Black shoes, no open toed shoes, sandals or high heels.
- 2. If boots are worn in winter, they may be black or brown.

Jewellery

- 1. Religious necklace pendants to be tucked inside the shirt.
- 2. Small stud earrings for girls.

School Bag

- 1. This should be a backpack of sensible size (not roller bag) which is large enough to carry daily equipment and able to fit into lockers.
- 2. Students are responsible for carrying their own school bags.

Students are not allowed the following:

Make up

• Make up, lip gloss, coloured nail varnish and tattoos are prohibited.

Footwear

- Brightly coloured shoes.
- Sandals or open toed shoes.
- High heels.

<u>Jewellery</u>

• Other than the items given above, no jewellery may be worn.

What will happen if you do not wear the correct uniform?

Students are expected to abide by the rules of IAA. If a student arrives at school out of uniform he or she will spend their breaks in detention. Any non-uniform articles will be taken away and held for the remainder of the day.

Organization

Organization

One thing that some students find difficult when coming to Secondary School is organizing their day. Below are a variety of ways designed to help you.

Lockers

The school provides each student with a locker which is situated near to their homeroom. Carrying lots of books around can be hard work, so keep them in your locker until you need them for a lesson. Always keep your locker locked and don't forget your key or combination.



Moodle

Every subject has its own Moodle page which needs to be checked at least 2-3 times a week. Teachers will post their focus for each lesson, along with the resources. Teachers will also tell you what your homework is on Moodle, and will also notify you of exam dates and material for exams. It is incredibly important to check Moodle to keep up to date with all of your responsibilities.

Moodle is also where Secondary news is posted including try-out opportunities, trips and the student bulletin. It is also useful to use Moodle messenger to keep in touch with your teachers.

Timetable

A copy of your timetable should be taped inside your locker and next to your work desk at home. You should check you timetable every night so that you can pack the correct equipment for the next day.

Laptop

You should bring your laptop to school every day FULLY CHARGED. You should also bring the cable with either a 3-pin plug or a suitable adapter. You will not be permitted to plug a 2-pin plug into the school's sockets. You need to make sure that you have installed the whole Microsoft Office suite and, if you have an Apple Mac computer, you should make sure that the MS version for Apple is installed. Please note that students, who use their laptop to play games or for other inappropriate purposes during the school day, will be logged for this infraction – 4 ICT infractions and you may be asked to leave the school. (See the ICT acceptable use policy below)

Watch

Punctuality is important. The senior school is very big and you need to make sure that you get to lessons on time. There are also places where you can't hear the bell, like the cafeteria and library. An inexpensive watch is a good idea. You are responsible if you are late!!

Bulletin Board

Organization is usually a transitional difficulty for 6th Graders. Good advice to you all is to buy a large pin board and keep it next to your work desk at home.
