# GUIDE TO REFERENCING USING MLA8

## **Basic Guidelines for Generating a Works Cited List:**

- Center the heading Works Cited at the top of a new page.
- Double space (format, line spacing, double).
- **Indent the second line** of each source (this is called a hanging indent).
- **Do not** include **http://** for any online website source.
- **Include** the date of access to any electronic source at the end of the citation.
- Capitalize book titles, italicize book titles, and use quotation marks for articles. End each entry with a period.
- Alphabetize each entry by the author's name or title of the article if there is not an author.
- Do not include the medium of publication (print, web, video).
- If there is more than one work by the same author, use the author's last name and then alphabetize according to the name of the book or articles.

- ---. "Dramatism and Logology." Communication Quarterly 33 (1985): 89-93.
- Capitalize the first, the last and all significant words of a title and subtitle regardless of how they are capitalized in your source.
- Omit initial articles (i.e. "A", "An", "The") for titles of journals, magazines and newspapers.
- Italicize titles and subtitles for works published independently; use quotation marks for works published only as part of another work, e.g. essay in a book or article in a journal.
- The city of publication is not required.
- Shorten the publisher's name. Use U for university and P for press.
- Missing publication information that you provide is in square brackets to show it did not come from the source; otherwise use n.p. for no place of publication or no publisher given, and n.d. for no date of publication given.
- To cite material from a database to which the library subscribes, such as JSTOR, use the URL of the article and the date of access.

# **Book by Single Author**

Last name, First name. Title of Book. Publisher, Year of Publication.

#### **Book by Two or More Authors**

Last name, First name, and Author's first name Author's last name. *Title of Book*. Publisher, Year of Publication.

Heer, Jeet, and Kent Worcester. A Comics Studies Reader. UP of Mississippi, 2008.

Gillis, Sander, et al. Grammar of the English Language. Random House, 1987.

# **Book (with editor)**

Last name, First name. Title. Ed. Editor's first name Editor's last name. Publisher, Year.

Review Author (Last Name, First Name). "Title of Review (if there is one)." Review of *Performance Title* by Author/Director/Artist. *Title of Periodical,* Day Month Year, page.

# **Article in Scholarly Journal Format**

# A Page on a Website

Editor, author, or compiler name (if available). "Page Name." *Name of Site*. Name of sponsor or publisher of site. Date of last update. Date of Access. URL.

#### In-text Citations: The Basics

- Wherever you incorporate another's words, facts, or ideas, insert a brief in-text citation. Give the
  author's last name and the page(s) of the source. If the author's name appears in the preceding
  sentence, you may omit it from the in-text citation. This includes direct quotations, paraphrases, and
  summaries of someone else's work.
- For web resources, unless the pages are numbered, use only the author's last name. If no author is indicated, use the first word of the title of that reference.
- In citing classic verse, plays and poems, omit page numbers and cite by division (act, scene, canto, book, part) and line, with periods separating the various numbers. Titles of famous works are often abbreviated (*Ham.* 1.5.35-37).
- Place the in-text reference as close to the cited material as possible, but ideally at the end of a sentence or where there is a pause.
- If a source has two or three authors, cite all names. For four or more authors, cite the first author's name followed by *et al.*
- If your paper uses more than one source by the same author, distinguish among them by including a shortened version of the title in a signal phrase in the text of the paper or in the in-text citation.

## Citing a Print Source With An Author

Wordsworth stated that Romantic poetry was marked by a "spontaneous overflow of powerful feelings" (263).

OR

Romantic poetry is characterized by the "spontaneous overflow of powerful feelings" (Wordsworth 263).

Wordsworth extensively explored the role of emotion in the creative process (263).

#### Citing a Print Source With No Author:

We see so many global warming hotspots in North America likely because this region has "more readily accessible climatic data and more comprehensive programs to monitor and study environmental change..." ("Impact of Global Warming" 6).

## **Citing Authors with Same Last Names**

Although some medical ethicists claim that cloning will lead to designer children (R. Miller 12), others note that the advantages for medical research outweigh this consideration (A. Miller 46).

## **Citing Work by Multiple Authors**

Smith, Yang, and Moore argue that tougher gun control is not needed in the United States (76).

The authors state "Tighter gun control in the United States erodes Second Amendment rights" (Smith, Yang, and Moore 76).

## **Multiple Works by the Same Author**

Lightenor has argued that computers are not useful tools for small children ("Too Soon" 38), though he has acknowledged elsewhere that early exposure to computer games does lead to better small motor skill development in a child's second and third year ("Hand-Eye Development" 17).

Visual studies, because it is such a new discipline, may be "too easy" (Elkins, "Visual Studies" 63).

# **Long Quotations**

Nelly Dean treats Heathcliff poorly and dehumanizes him throughout her narration:

They entirely refused to have it in bed with them, or even in their room, and I had no more sense, so, I put it on the landing of the stairs, hoping it would be gone on the morrow. By chance, or else attracted by hearing his voice, it crept to Mr. Earnshaw's door, and there he found it on quitting his chamber. Inquiries were made as to how it got there; I was obliged to confess, and in recompense for my cowardice and inhumanity was sent out of the house. (Bronte 78)

# **In-text Example for Adding Words**

Jan Harold Brunvand, in an essay on urban legends, states: "some individuals [who retell urban legends] make a point of learning every rumor or tale" (78).

# **In-text example for Omitting Words:**

In an essay on urban legends, Jan Harold Brunvand notes that "some individuals make a point of learning every recent rumor or tale . . . and in a short time a lively exchange of details occurs" (78).

# Appendix 1: Tables, Charts, Graphs, Illustrations and Works of Art

In MLA8, data tables are labelled as **Tables**. These tables should be used to report data only.

Graphs (made to illustrate raw data), charts, illustrations and works of art are all labelled as Figures.


In all cases, the materials inserted should be referred to and discussed within the text <u>before</u> placing the material.

#### In-text examples:

- Table 1 below reports Endicott's findings on teenage screen time.
- In Figure 1, the artist has carefully created a mosaic pixel by pixel.
- Figure 7 below plots the distribution of vaccines over time against the number of actual cases reported in Nigeria.

After the discussion, place your table or figure flush left in the document. Under the document, label it as a Table or a Figure with a number and give it a proper title. Then, follow the title with the entire citation in MLA style.
