

What is a community project


- a culminating example of inquiry: it reflects the student's ability to initiate, manage and direct their own inquiry
- focuses on community and service
- encourages students to explore their rights and responsibilities to implement SAA in the community
- gives students the opportunity to develop awareness of needs in various communities
- A project that prepares 8th graders for the personal project in grade 10 and the extended essay in grade 12

Aims of MYP Community Project

- participate in a sustained, self-directed inquiry within a global context
- generate creative new insights and develop deeper understandings through in-depth investigation
- demonstrate the skills, attitudes and knowledge required to complete a project over an extended period of time
- communicate effectively in a variety of situations
- demonstrate responsible action through, or as a result of, learning
- appreciate the process of learning and take pride in their accomplishments.



While working on their Community Project, students are developing ATL Skills



Types of Service as Action:

When deciding how to serve the community, students may consider the following four types of service:

- Direct Service
- Indirect service
- Advocacy
- Research

Direct

Students interact with recipients

Indirect

Students do not see the recipients but offer them a service remotely

Research Based

Collect information/data to influence or change

Advocacy

Speak on behalf of a cause or concern to promote action: produce a play/ create a video

Objectives and steps: A.Investigating

- Determine a need within a community
- Define a goal to address the need
- Submit Project Proposal
- Conduct initial research and gather information

Defining a goal to address a need in the community

Some examples of goals are to.....

- inform others
- participate actively
- research
- create/innovate
- change behaviors
- advocate.

A Need can be defined as a condition or situation in which something is required or wanted; a duty or obligation; or a lack of something requisite, desirable or useful.

B. Planning

- Develop a plan for action
- Create success criteria for the project
- Prepare for Service
- Manage time and materials
- Record project development in Process Journal

C. Taking Action

- Carry out the service project
- Make decisions
- Develop understanding and solve problems
- Communicate with supervisors, experts and others
- Record Information in Process Journal

D. Reflecting

Evaluate the impact of their service Reflect on their project and their learning

The Supervisor's role



What should the students submit?

- a completed academic honesty form for each student
- the proposal for action
- process journal extracts (10 A4 pages)
- any supporting visual aids used during the presentation
- Works Cited Page (stating the resources they used)
- A minimum 3 OPVL recourses

Process journal

- The process journal is a student- centered tool (learning strategy) that supports project development
- A good process journal:
- Documents students thoughts, actions and behaviors
- Shows meaningful reflection of ATL skills
 - Functions as a documentation of information and examples to support students descriptions of their achievements, skills development and personal growth

Guide line for service at school:

Any request to perform service at school must be submitted to myself, Mr. Martin and Mrs. Susanne by email. Overall, the students:

- make a reasonable evaluation of how they might address the need in the community
- Feel empowered of the goal they can reasonably achieve in the suggested time frame of the project
- recognize the impact of their service as action as significant in the community

Presenting the community project

Oral presentation

For an individual student presentation, the time allocated is 6–10 minutes.

Parents role:

- Encouraging students to choose suitable topics

 Helping students to communicate with associations and experts

- Communicate with the supervisor when necessary
